Issue 13 had all the earmarks of a final issue, including vague & specific comments throughout that it would indeed be the final issue. There was a comment in there about how my life was calling and, for once, I was going to call back.

Thing is, life didn't actually return my calls for another few months.

On May 17, back in my old room at my parents' house, I started my summer – with no pit band, no school, no job, no offers. A month later, that situation hadn't changed, despite the piles of resumes going out, and other than a few shifts delivering flowers as a sub for my Dad, there wasn't much on my plate.

Nearly all my time was free time. So in June, there I was with X-acto, rubber cement, & clippings, and soon Issue 14 existed. July, August, more of the same – 1992 would be our busiest publishing year ever: 10 issues and a holiday card.

My musical hero Tom Lehrer once famously called the second song in his set "my first encore."

That in mind, I invite you to enjoy Issue 101: Our 88th Encore Issue since that 'final' one 25 years ago.





Fine Points of the Law

Residents in southern Humboldt County, California, will vote in May on a proposed property tax increase to fund a community hospital in Garberville to serve a web of small towns in the scenic, sparsely populated region, and thanks to a county judge's March ruling, the issue will be explained more colorfully. Opponent Scotty McClure was initially rebuffed by the registrar when he tried to distribute, as taxpayer-funded "special elections material," contempt for "Measure W" by including the phrase "(insert fart smell here)" in the description. The registrar decried the damage to election "integrity" by such "vulgarity," but Judge Timothy Cissna said state law gives him jurisdiction only over "false" or "misleading" electioneering language.

CANNIBALISM IS BAD FOR YOUR HEALTH

Cannibalism may be generally frowned upon these days, but it was only last century that human blood was used as medicine in parts of Europe.

Now, eating our fellow humans is considered the sort of nightmare scenario you'd associate with a huge disaster eradicating all other sources of food.

Which is just as well because, the ethics aside, it's REALLY bad for you. In fact, cannibalism can kill.

Until about 50 years ago in Papua New Guinea, cannibalism was still widely practised, with members of the Fore tribe eating their deceased family members, the indy100 reports.

The unpleasant side-effect of this consumption of human tissues was to develop Kuru, also known as the "laughing disease."

Kuru is a very rare, incurable neurodegenerative disorder caused by a twisted protein in human flesh prions, which survive heat and being cooked.

Prions wreak devastation by killing nerve cells in the brain, rendering it like a sponge, full of holes.

Kuru means "to shiver" or "trembling in fear" owing to its symptoms.



But you wouldn't know that by looking at the court dockets, which have been loaded of late with suits filed by litigious fans, players and dinosaur. Herewith, Sports ILLUSTRATED'S favorite silly suits.

- In 1999 an Ottawa Senators season-ticket holder filed a \$27.5 million suit against holdout Alexei Yashin on the grounds that the value of tickets diminished when the captain held out for more money. It was thrown out of court.
- When he was traded to the Redskins in 2004, Clinton Portis offered new teammate Ifeanyi Ohalete \$40,000—in three installments—for the right to wear Ohalete's number 26. After Ohalete got

cut, Portis stopped the payments. They settled: Ohalete got a total of \$38,000.

Frozen Dead Guy Days

[REUTERS] - Every March the cryogenically frozen corpse of a Norwegian man breathes fresh life into sleepy Nederland, Colorado, where throngs of fun-lovers fill the streets for "Frozen Dead Guy Days," a festival in honor of the town's most famous resident.

The annual three-day festival is the brainchild of a local businesswoman who came up with the whimsical idea 16 years ago as a way to attract visitors to Nederland, where the man's body has laid in repose in a shed since 1993. From a modest crowd of about 1000 the first year, the festival now draws about 20,000 visitors, many of them dressing in Halloween costumes as they revel in such quirky events as a polar plunge, a frozen salmon toss. musical acts and a costume ball.

This year's festivities began with a parade of a dozen hearses, followed by a "coffin race" through the streets of the Rocky Mountain town, where temperatures hovered just above the freezing mark.

The annual bash honors Bredo Morstoel. who died and cryogenically frozen in his native Norway in 1989 with the hope that low temperatures will allow him to be resuscitated sometime in the future. After a four-year stint at a California facility, his grandson moved him in 1993 to his property outside of Nederland, 17 miles west of Boulder. Morstoel's grandson no longer lives in Nederland and the family has no connection to the celebrations other than paying for his upkeep.

Once the festival ends, 59-year-old Brad Wickham will resume his job as Morstoel's caretaker, every two weeks hauling 1000 pounds of dry ice carbon dioxide in solid form - to the sarcophagus and packing it around the corpse.

"There are a lot of scientists studying cryogenics, but I'm just a guy with a truck and a strong back," he said.

Putting the 'P' in Pilsner

[REUTERS] – A Danish brewery is drawing on 50,000 liters of urine collected from the largest music festival in Northern Europe in producing a novelty beer aimed at the more adventurous drinker.

The beer named "Pisner" - a word-play combining pilsner with local slang for urine - contains no human waste, but is produced from fields of malting barley fertilized with human urine rather than traditional animal manure or factory-made plant nutrients.

"When the news that we had started brewing the Pisner came out, a lot of people thought we were filtering the urine to put it directly in the beer and we had a good laugh about that," said Henrik Vang, Chief Executive of brewer Norrebro Bryghus.

Using human waste as fertilizer on such a scale is a novelty, said Denmark's Agriculture and Food Council, which came up with the idea for what could be the ultimate sustainable hipster beer and has already named the concept "beercycling."

Masked 'Newsbreakers' disrupt two TV broadcasts

(January 7, 2005) — If you thought you saw a man in an "invisible suit" in the background of TV news broadcasts Thursday, you weren't mistaken.

A member of a group calling itself Newsbreakers got into live shots broadcast by WROC (Channel 8) and WHEC (Channel 10) during the noon news Thursday. Reporters from those stations were outside Highland Hospital, reporting live about an electrical failure at the hospital, when the man got into their camera shots.

The man, dressed in a tan bodysuit with the words "Invisible Suit" across the chest, jumped and danced around in the background. WROC cut away from the shot. The man also made it into the end of the WHEC news clip.

Executives at both stations said bystanders frequently try to get on camera during live shots, but Thursday's incident was different.

"It's something we face all the time," said Adam Bradshaw, WHEC news director. "But this is clearly a case where they fully intended to disrupt our live shot and, for us, rather unsuccessfully. That's not the best way to get your message across. You turn the audience off."




Never Mind: Would-be Robber Apologizes to Clerk

MYRTLE BEACH, S.C. (AP) — Police in South Carolina are seeking a man who apologized after attempting to rob a convenience store.

The Sun News reports that Horry County police say they responded June 18 to a Circle K in Little River after the unidentified man walked inside and demanded money while holding a knife.

A police report says a night clerk told them the man entered the store around 1 am and approached the counter. Police say the "unfazed" clerk didn't give the man money and told him to leave. The man realized his efforts were going nowhere and apologized, put the knife back in his pocket and left.

Tourism Execs Seek 'Backup' Cocktail-mixing Toe

The theft of a famed cocktail ingredient, a mummified human toe, has spurred the northern Canadian territory of Yukon to launch a tongue-in-cheek campaign for an "insurance" toe, in case the digit gets stolen again.

In Yukon's Dawson City, drinking a cocktail with a pickled toe is a time-honored tradition that more than 100,000 visitors have undertaken, according to the municipality.

The toe was stolen from a local hotel on June 18, sparking national headlines. It came back by mail four days later along with an apology letter, according to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

The Travel Yukon government tourism organization asked on Twitter for pictures of toes in the "Toenation Contest," which will grant the winner a free trip to the remote, sparsely populated territory, a neighbor of Alaska.

"Our toe was returned, but we can always use backups!" Travel Yukon tweeted. "Donate yours for a Yukon trip. Will your toe make the cut?"

According to Dawson City, a local man created the drink after finding a jar with the amputated frost-bitten toe of a rumrunner from the 1920s.

"Be sure to remember the most important rule: 'You can drink it fast, you can drink it slow, but your lips have gotta touch the toe," according to the city's website.

RCMP said a male suspect in the theft case called police after officers identified him. The man allegedly left his identification at the hotel, after downing the cocktail, according to the Yukon News. The toe came back with the apology letter, signed "a drunken fool," according to the newspaper.

"At the time that the package was opened, the toe was believed to be in good condition," RCMP said. "Charges are not expected to be laid in this matter."

4. Carlo Gesualdo

GEOFF COX on the composer who was also good at dismembering relatives

A PAINTING HANGS in the Capuchin convent of Santa Maria della Grazie, in the village of Gesualdo, 80miles east of Naples. At first sight, an unremarkable example of the late 16thcentury judgement allegory, thronging with saints: The Virgin Mary; a sad-eyed Magdalene with her tub of perfumed ointment; the archangel Michael; Saint Francis and several others, all beseeching a bare-chested Redeemer, his raised right hand offering hope of salvation.

The sinner, a thin-faced nobleman kneels, extravagantly-ruffed and flanked by a Cardinal who also petitions the Almighty. Two adult figures and a winged child are borne aloft, perhaps plucked from the purgatorial flames that consume the lower third of the altarpiece.

Butchered bodies

THE CHAPEL AND its contents were commissioned as an act of expiation by Carlo Gesualdo, third Prince of Venosa: writer of exquisite, sorrowful madrigals and devotional pieces of strange, dark discord and beauty; the most extreme musical mannerist of the late Renaissance: and scion of one of Sicily's most venerable families.

A composer whose works have been both exalted - by Stravinsky and others - and denigrated as "harsh, crude... shocking and extremely disgusting", it is his dark, El Greco features which address the grave Christ, seeking absolution for some terrible sin.

On the night of October 16, 1590, the bloody bodies of two illustrious Neapolitans, Don Fabrizio Carafa, Duke of Andria, and the noted beauty, Signora Donna Maria d'Avalos, were discovered in the bedchamber of the imposing Palazzo di San Severo in Naples, residence of Carlo Gesualdo. Both had been butchered with extraordinary violence: limbs and torsos riven by multiple stab wounds. In several instances, the weapon appeared to have passed clean through flesh and bone. scoring deep gouges into the hardwood floorboards.

Curiously, the Duke's corpse, head battered and slashed nearly in two, was dressed only in a woman's tasselled nightgown. The bodies were examined by magistrates, cleaned and handed over to relatives. Depositions were taken from two household servants. The statements of both valet and maid left no doubt as to the assassin's identity: their master, Don Carlo, in the company of three others, had

murdered his wife and her lover.

Third victim

THE CRIME captured the public's imagination, and was remembered in verse and rumour. Some held that a third victim - Donna Maria's second child, in whose infant features the cuckolded Prince had discerned those of his hated rival - had been discovered, his cruel fate hushed up to avoid further scandal. While his wife's adultery spared Don Carlo the charge of murder, the rumoured involvement of third parties was frowned upon.

Gesualdo fled, first to his country retreat and then, in 1594, to Ferrara, a cultural paradise presided over by grand musical patron Duke Afonso II. The Duke's cousin, Donna Leonora d'Este, became Don Carlo's second wife in an unhappy marriage contracted later that year. While in Ferrara, Don Carlo published the first four of six books of madrigals and devoted himself to music, hunting and, no doubt, the "excess"

of which Leonora accused him in her petition for divorce.

Don Carlo spent the last 15 years of his life at Gesualdo. Riven by guilt and - according to contemporary accounts - "a vast horde of demons which gave him no peace... unless 12 voung men... beat him violently three times a day", he brooded, continuing work on his beautiful, dissonant Responsaries for Holy Week, which were published in 1611.

He died of unrecorded causes in 1613, aged 53, and was buried in Naples. His tomb was lost to an earthquake in 1688.



James Dinardi, 44, of Columbia, Mo., died at a hospital Monday. Police said he had moved to the area on June 23.


"The distraught individual had met the individual lady on the Internet, started up a romance," Police Chief Paul J. Lessard said.

Sheriff finds capture barely believable

PIKE TWP.: Any drunk in Pike Township early Wednesday night probably wouldn't have believed his eyes.

Certainly those who were sober were stunned.

A 250-pound black bear was riding in the back seat of a Stark County sheriff's cruiser — and having the time of his life, Sheriff W. Bruce Umpleby said.

After what apparently was a three-day stroll through southern Stark County, Otis the bear was enticed back into captivity with some food and cajoling by Umpleby, two deputies and the county coroner's two forensic investigators.

"It was a sight to behold from the moment you saw Otis along the roadway until he was back at the barn from which he walked away Sunday night," said Umpleby, still laughing yesterday every time he thought of the declawed 2year-old bear.

The sheriff said the bear is owned by Michael P. Siers of Wilmot and is kept at a compound with other wild animals off Downing Street in Pike Township. Authorities still aren't sure whether the door was left open or someone unlocked it. Pry marks were found on the door, Umpleby said.

Nothing was heard about the bear's whereabouts until about 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, when motorists and residents said they saw the bear walking along Dueber Avenue Southwest, south of Downing. Several motorists were trying to detain Otis by feeding him whatever they had with them until deputies arrived.

Umpleby and deputies Terry Curry and Francisco Cuevas were met at the scene by coroner's investigators Rick Walters and Harry Campbell.

Using a Rice Krispies snack bar from Curry's lunch, Campbell lured Otis into the back seat of the cruiser. Umpleby closed the door behind Otis as Campbell scooted out the other side and shut the door in front of the animal.

The 1½-mile drive back to his barn was a hoot, Umpleby said. As Cuevas drove, the cruiser swaved from side to side every time the bear shifted on his seat, which is separated from the front seat by a metal divider.

"It was a tight fit, but he liked the ride so well, it took a box of doughnuts to get him out of the cruiser," Umpleby said.

Umpleby warned that while black bears are more docile than brown or grizzly bears, "they are still dangerous and the public should call state wildlife or law-enforcement authorities rather than try to feed or play with them."

"These animals, although appearing to be quite tame, are still wild animals in the eyes of wildlife officials . . . and they still have big teeth," he said.


The sheriff said that he has no pictures of Otis in or out of the cruiser. "I'd love to have one just because it was so hilarious."
