I'm scheduled to turn 50 in a few months.

I've phrased it that way since coming to terms with a certain cardiac condition of mine, but the phrasing is a good reminder: there are plans, there are expectations, and there are *The Things That Actually Happen*, and these three things don't often agree.

It's a weird world we're in right now. It's not the safest place to be. Many of us are sheltering in place, or doing our best approximation, and some of us are forced to be out in this weird world every day. I'm fortunate that I'm not, but I know there are many, many who are not so fortunate, and I worry about them. I worry about you. I worry about all of us.

This is one of the stranger times in which I've put an issue together. The first issue after 9/11 was... unusual. Oh, the October 2001 issue was full of the usual *errata*, *ephemera*, *et cetera*, but as it moved toward its conclusion, the elephant in the room gradually required more and more of everyone's attention.



That issue was the then-standard 14 pages in length, the first 10 being mostly what you'd normally expect in these pages. Page 11 was my own meditation, an essay about what had just happened, how the world was changing, and why there was still a need, to my mind, to find a way to laugh. To relax. To take a break from the weight of it all. Page 12 was a full-page picture of the now-famous flag hanging from the wreckage at Ground Zero in those early days. Pages 13 & 14 were comprised of a single sheet of black paper.

I'm not sure I got the tone right in 2001. I'm not sure I'm getting it right in 2020 either. But I'm not doing a black page in this issue, and I'm not doing a lot of reflection, outside this space. There is fear. There is panic. There is suffering. There is pain. There is darkness. But – still in great quantities – there is light. There is hope. There is help. There is humanity. There is a kind of... isolated togetherness.

And there are still humans doing very, *very* dumb things. Let's have a much-needed laugh as we read about them, shall we? Stay safe, stay healthy, and let's plan to meet back here again next time. Or, at least, let's put it on the schedule, OK?







All Cats Dream of Being Mountain Lions

Washington, DC (Hilary Hanson, Huffington Post) – The mountain lion residents feared turned out to be... just a long Cookie.

Georgetown resident Giulia di Marzo posted footage on a neighborhood blog showing an animal she wrote looked "a lot like a mountain lion." In the video, a large cat is seen climbing a fence before jumping out of the frame. "Has anyone seen this animal before?" she added. "Or does anyone have a pet that looks awfully like a mountain lion around here? Worried about my small, fat house cat."

Several local media outlets ran with the story, fueling speculation that the video's star was indeed a cougar. Local wildlife experts were skeptical, however. "Luckily, the mountain lion is not one of the many wildlife species that call the District home," D.C. Department of Energy and Environment Director Tommy Wills told DCist. He added that mountain lions don't have striped tails like the one seen on the cat in the video.



But the mystery of the huge cat's identity now appears to be solved. Local woman Sarah Wasson has come forward and told NBC 4 that the cat in the video is her own pet, Cookie. "He's utterly docile," she said. "He's small. He's a domestic cat and we've had him for six and a half years." That said, Cookie's size may still be a matter of perspective. His veterinarian, Lee Morgan, told the station that Cookie was a long cat who "takes up most of the table" when he comes in for a visit.

Pigeon Poops, Proves Point

Chicago (AP) – A pigeon apparently didn't think much of a lawmaker's ideas to address a messy situation at a Chicago Transit Authority stop known by some as "pigeon poop station." WBBM-TV reports that one of the birds did its business on the head of Democratic state Rep. 
Thai Leader Uses Cardboard Cutout to Deflect Reporters' Questions



Bangkok (AP) — One Monday, Thailand's prime minister evaded journalists' questions by bringing out a life-sized cardboard cutout of himself and telling the reporters to quiz it instead of him. Prayuth Chan-ocha then turned on his heel and walked off, leaving the mockup behind, to bemused looks and awkward laughter from the Government House press pack.

The prime minister had briefly spoken to the media after attending an event promoting upcoming Children's Day, but deployed his dodging tactic before anyone could ask him about a number of pressing political issues. "If you want to ask any questions on politics or conflict," he said, "ask this guy."

It isn't the first time Prayuth - a general who seized power in a bloodless coup in 2014 - has dumbfounded the media. In the past he has fondled the ear of a sound technician for several minutes during an impromptu news conference, flung a banana peel at cameramen, and threatened, with gruff humor, to execute any journalist who criticized his government. When it took power, his government, packed with military leaders, enjoyed considerable public support for ending a prolonged period of often-violent street politics. But as the junta's rule has stretched on, criticism of its often-repressive policies and lack of transparency has grown markedly.



Goodyear, AZ (AP) - An Arizona woman is facing charges after police say she fired shots at her husband while he sat on the toilet to make him "listen." KNXV-TV reports 69-year-old Linda Jean Fahn was arrested following a frantic call from her husband. He told Goodyear police Fahn barged in while he was using the restroom and fired two shots above his head. According to a police report, Fahn said, "I shot two bullets at the wall above his head to make him listen to me." The shots were fired about seven inches above the man's head as he was slouched on the toilet. Fahn has been charged with aggravated assault.



Fiddling While... Wait, WHAT?



(SkyNews) - A woman has undergone brain surgery while playing the violin to ensure surgeons did not damage the part which controls the fine movement of her hands. Dagmar Turner, a 53-year-old management consultant and passionate violinist from the Isle of Wight, had a tumour removed at King's College Hospital. She was worried she may lose her music skills, so she suggested she be allowed to play the violin during the operation. Professor Keyoumars Ashkan, a consultant neurosurgeon at the hospital, came up with the plan to reduce the risk.

Surgeons mapped her brain, opened the skull and then got her to play the violin as the tumour was removed. Footage shows her picking up the instrument during the surgery and playing scales with her eyes shut. "This was the first time I've had a patient play an instrument," he said.

Turner thanked the surgeons afterwards for preserving her 40-year love for the instrument. "The violin is my passion," she said. "I've been playing since I was 10 years old. The thought of losing my ability to play heartbreaking."





Slight Problem with Ontario's New License Plates: You Can't Read Them

(Laurel Wamsley, NPR) - Ontario's newly-designed license plates just hit a speed bump.

Almost immediately, people compared the plate design unfavorably to a box of Q-tips. The plates had a new slogan - "A Place to Grow" - which drew the ire of some critics, who preferred the previous "Yours to Discover," which the plates had sported since 1982. And there was the palette: observers noticed the new plates had the same blue color scheme as Doug Ford's Progressive Conservative Party.

But the real problems began once the plates went into use. A Twitter user who describes himself as a police sergeant in Kingston, Ontario, posted a photo with the complaint: "Did anyone consult with police before designing and manufacturing the new Ontario licence plates? They're virtually unreadable at night."

It appears the new plate design is struggling with its most important job: clarity.



Toronto videojournalist Andrew Collins noticed that the new plates are "totally unreadable from a distance at night." He tweeted this (unretouched) still from a dashcam video.

"It's crazy, right? It's unbelievable," says Toronto videojournalist Andrew Collins. "If citizens can't read them and call in impaired drivers and traffic complaints, a police officer is certainly not going to be able to read them in a chase situation," he posits.

Journalists at Toronto's CTV network wanted to see whether they could re-create the problem, so they shined a light on the new and old plates while slowly moving away. In their video, the old plate remains plainly legible, while the letters on the new one quickly disappear into a blaze of

Unsurprisingly, police chiefs in the province are concerned. "Some officers are surprised and have been taking photos," Ontario Association of Chiefs of Police spokesman Joe Couto told the Ottawa Citizen. "It shows very clearly that, especially at night, there may be some visibility issues." He said some police departments reported that their handheld scanners weren't able to read the new plates.

In an emailed statement, Ontario's government says it "consulted with key stakeholders to test the readability, reflectivity and functionality of the new high definition plate design. Ontario's new high definition licence plates were tested using advanced plate reader technology under multiple visibility conditions, and plates were successfully read under those conditions." But it acknowledged that "some Ontarians are reporting concerns with readability to the naked-eye under certain light conditions," and says it is looking into the issue.

Detroit (AP) – Leave it to the internet to interpret Garth Brooks wearing a Barry Sanders jersey during a concert in Detroit as a political endorsement of a certain liberal presidential candidate.

The more than 70,000 fans who attended the country music star's Feb. 22 show at Ford Field understood it for what it was: a tribute to one of greatest NFL running backs and Detroit Lions players ever. Brooks told the audience that he donned




Sanders' No. 20 jersey to pay homage to him since they both went to Oklahoma State University.

After the show, Brooks posted a photo on social media of himself wearing the jersey, which has "Sanders" and "20" emblazoned on the back. That's where the trouble started.

Annoyed fans ripped Brooks in the comment sections under the photo, believing he was endorsing Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders and the self-proclaimed democratic socialist's 2020 presidential campaign. "I had no idea you were a big freaking liberal socialist! I've listened to your songs for the last time!" one person wrote. Another wrote, "If this is for Bernie Sanders, I'm done with you. I thought you were a true American that loves our country." Others pointed out the apparent confusion over Brooks' post or made fun of those who read too much into it. "How much did KFC pay you to wear this?" a commenter wrote, referring to another famous Sanders: Colonel.

There's no indication of who Brooks supports politically, though he performed at former Democratic President Barack Obama's 2009 inauguration. Barry Sanders – the Hall of Fame running back – took it all in stride, tweeting his fellow OSU alum, "Hey @garthbrooks, want to be my VP? #Number20For2020." Brooks responded in jest, "I would run any race with you! #Number20for2020 HA!!!"

Australia (David Moye, Huffington Post) – A cattle breeding farm in Gippsland, Australia, is in a load of hurt after 100 cylinders of prized bull semen went up in smoke in a fire. The blaze at Yarram Herd Services, which offers artificial insemination and breeding advice to farmers, caused 100 cryogenic cylinders containing the bull sperm to explode and splatter the burning building, according to Daily Mail Australia.

The fire was a "huge blow" for the business, Yarram Herd Services spokesperson Aaron Thomas told the Australian Broadcasting Company. "The actual cylinders are worth between \$500 and \$1000 per unit, but the semen inside them varies in price," Thomas said "We're coming into the AI season so there would have been substantial amounts of semen inside the tanks that we've lost, which was owned by our local farmers, and it can range in value from \$5 per straw to \$95 per straw."

Putting out the fire was a unique challenge because "the lids of the cryogenic cylinders were just popping off the top and projectiles were being thrown from the building," Chris Loeschenkohl, a fire commander, told the Metro. Firefighters faced so many sticking points that they fought the blaze for more than two hours before bringing it under control.

Yuma, AZ (AP) – An Arizona man is facing charges after police say he waved a gun at a fast-food drive-thru window and demanded hot sauce. Police say Abel Lerma pulled a gun on an employee at a Filiberto's Mexican Food restaurant and demanded hot sauce, which is given free with every food purchase. Lerma and the driver of the car were later arrested. Lerma posted a \$50,000 bond and was released under the supervision of pretrial services, then was arrested again and charged with aggravated DUI and endangerment for having a child under the age of 15 in the car. Lerma's court-appointed attorney, John Serrano, says he is working on hearings for both cases to be held together.

He said the cause of the fire isn't known, but it appears to be accidental and the house will be considered a total loss.



Amanda Monson, a librarian with the LaPorte County Library in Indiana, tweeted out a pic that may have whet the appetites of taco lovers while turning the stomachs of bookworms. Monson said the taco pic came from "an actual book found in the book drop at my library in Indiana a few years back."

A Twitter user identified the book with the taco as "Nonsense Songs and Stories," illustrated by Edward Lear. Monson told the outlet the book was donated to the library, but it wasn't put on shelves. "The staff took a photo of it and threw the book away," Monson said.



This isn't the first inappropriate bookmark Monson has seen since she started working as a librarian seven years ago. Other bizarre bookmarks include uncashed paychecks, credit cards, \$50 or \$100 bills and panty liners. "You can ask any public librarian, and they will have stories about the weird things that get left in books and returned to us," she said.

Man Uses USPS to Change Address... of UPS

(Laurel Wamsley for NPR) – As federal crimes go, this one seems to have been ridiculously easy to pull off.

Dushaun Henderson-Spruce submitted a U.S. Postal Service change of address form on Oct. 26, 2017, according to court documents. He requested changing a corporation's mailing address from an address in Atlanta to the address of his apartment on Chicago's North Side.

The post office duly updated the address, and Henderson-Spruce allegedly began receiving the company's mail – including checks. It went on for months. Prosecutors say he deposited some \$58,000 in checks improperly forwarded to his address. The corporation isn't named in the court documents, but the Chicago Tribune reports that it's the shipping company UPS.

In a statement to NPR, UPS said it "was notified that some U.S. mail, intended for UPS employees at the company's headquarters address, was redirected by an unauthorized change of address by a third party. The U.S. Postal Service (USPS) corrected the issue and the USPS Postal Inspector is investigating the incident."

For nearly three months, mail addressed to UPS's corporate headquarters was forwarded to Henderson-Spruce's apartment. He received so much mail that the mail carrier had to leave it in a USPS tub outside his door, the Tribune reports. The mail carrier told investigators that "voluminous" amounts of company mail were delivered to Henderson-Spruce, sometimes handed to him directly.

The mail contained personal identifying information of employees, as well as business checks and invoices, according to the affadavit. He was also sent American Express corporate credit cards. Henderson-Spruce allegedly deposited into his bank account some 10 checks addressed to the company, totaling approximately \$58,000.

This went on until Jan. 16, when UPS security flagged the situation to the U.S. Postal Inspection Service. On Jan. 25, postal inspectors searched Henderson-Spruce's apartment in Chicago's Rogers Park neighborhood and found about 3,000 pieces of mail addressed to the company in Atlanta, court documents say. He reportedly told investigators that he had worked part-time at a company facility in 2012 or so.


The Tribune spoke briefly with Henderson-Spruce outside his apartment building and reported that he "hinted that he'd received the UPS mail as a result of a mix-up that was not his fault and that his identity may have been stolen, but he declined to elaborate." Henderson-Spruce now faces federal charges of mail theft, which carries a maximum sentence of five years, and mail fraud, which can be up to 20.

While this case is eye-popping — no one at the post office thought it weird that a guy was getting thousands of pieces of a company's mail forwarded to his apartment? — there have been many reports of regular people having their mailing addresses changed without their knowledge.

KPIX, a CBS affiliate in San Francisco, reported in November that it had filed Freedom of Information Act requests with multiple branches of the Postal Service. It learned that the Postal Inspection Service had received 17,077 complaints "relating to fraudulent address changes" in the past year and that the USPS had received "approximately 46,058 inquiries from customers concerning the validity of the change-of-address order" since January 2016.

The Postal Service encourages customers to retrieve their mail on a daily basis or monitor it online. "Any suspicious activity, or non-receipt of mail over a couple days should be reported to their local post office, or to our federal law enforcement arm, the U.S. Postal Inspection Service."





Ig Nobel Awards Honor 2019's Weirdest Science Discoveries

Boston (Mark Pratt, Huffington Post) – Training surgeons is as easy as training dolphins or dogs. At least according to a study that earned a 2019 Ig Nobel, the annual Nobel Prize spoof that rewards weird, odd and sometimes head-scratching scientific discoveries. This year's winners included: Dutch and Turkish researchers who figured out which nation has the yuckiest money, an Italian scientist who urges consumption of pizza for its health benefits, and an Iranian engineer who obtained a U.S patent for a diaper-changing machine.

Karen Pryor, Theresa McKeon and Dr. I. Martin Levy figured out that a common technique used for training animals called operant learning — or clicker training — can be used to make better surgeons. A mechanical device that emits an audible click is used to reinforce positive behavior. It's not quite the same as giving a doctor a treat and a pat on the head, but it still works, said Pryor, a scientist, writer and animal trainer who has been using the technique for decades. "Traditionally, experienced surgeons will train the younger surgeons and they make it quite hard," which leads to tension and fear of failure, she said. "With our method, they learned to use the tools with great confidence and calmness and turned them into calm, pleasant, serene people," she said.

The awards at the 29th annual ceremony at Harvard University were handed out by real Nobel laureates, and as has become the tradition, featured the world premiere of a mini opera titled "Creatures of Habit." The winners received \$10 trillion Zimbabwean dollars, which is virtually worthless, and each was given one minute to deliver an acceptance speech enforced by an 8-year-old girl whining "Please stop. I'm bored."

Andreas Voss and his colleagues found that germophobes might want to avoid Romanian bank notes. Their study concluded that three types of drug-resistant bacteria clung the longest to Romanian money when compared to several other international currencies, including the euro, U.S. and Canadian dollars and Indian rupees.

Voss, a professor at Radboud University Center for Infectious Diseases, Canisius-Wilhelmina Hospital, Nijmegen, the Netherlands, has a simple solution for people squeamish about handling paper money crawling with bacteria. "Use plastic and electronic payment," he said via email.

Silvano Gallus won an Ig Nobel for his research that found yes, pizza is good for you. Well, maybe just pizza that's made and consumed in Italy. "We found that pizza consumption in Italy was protective for many chronic diseases that are known to be influenced by diet: digestive tract cancers and infarction," Gallus, head of the Laboratory of Lifestyle Epidemiology at the Istituto di Ricerche Farmacologiche Mario Negri in Milan, Italy said in an email. He noted that many pizza ingredients are associated with the Mediterranean diet, which has known health benefits.



Last Officer Standing Steps Down, Then Strips Down

(SkyNews) – A police officer in the US caused a scene at a local board meeting of his department by stripping down to his underwear and walking out into a snowstorm. Richard Lee, who was the only police officer in the town of Croydon in New Hampshire, lost his job when the board closed down the area's branch, giving neighbouring New Hampshire State Police full coverage of the town.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Lee, was asked to immediately turn over his gun, badge and uniform, as well as the keys to his police cruiser. Lee told Valley News that he then went into the office that he shared with town officials, and took off his clothes in front of the board's chairman. He said, "I gave them my uniform shirt. I gave them my turtleneck, I gave them my ballistic vest... I sat down in the chair, took off my boots, took off my pants, put those in the chair, and put my boots back on, and walked out the door."

Without any spare clothes in the office, Lee had to walk for nearly a mile, in a storm, in just his underwear, before his wife could pick him up to take him the rest of the seven-mile journey to his home in neighbouring Newport. He added that he left his gear as he did not want to face the prospect of being arrested. As he stripped off, the chairman told Lee he did not need to do so - but the officer hit back, saying he was only following orders. Lee is said to be discussing what happened with his lawyer. The members of the board did not respond to a request for comment.

Owl Be On Alert

New Gloucester, ME (AP) – Officials at a Maine outdoor center are warning skiers to watch out for an "aggressive dive-bombing" owl that struck a man. Pineland Farms says in a Facebook post the owl cut the man's head when it attacked, and neither skiers nor trail groomers have seen the bird since. Pineland says the owl is protecting a nest near a cross-country ski trail. They believe the bird is either a barred owl or a great horned owl. The center has posted warning signs around the trail. They recommend people wave their arms overhead or wear a hat if they must pass by the area. Pineland says "owls are silent when they strike, so you will not hear it coming."



Could turkeys be sensing the peril of the season? Police in Bridgewater, Massachusetts, tweeted a warning to the town's residents on Oct. 15 about aggressive wild turkeys, WBZ-TV reported. As proof, an accompanying video showed four turkeys chasing a Bridgewater police cruiser, but police were not as amused as their Twitter followers. "Aggressive turkeys are a problem in town," the department tweeted. "State law doesn't allow the police or (animal control) to remove them."



\$#*&! Cursing Law Gets % ^ &ing Repealed

(Jordan Pascale, NPR) – In Virginia, letting an F-bomb fly in public could get you slapped with a misdemeanor and up to a \$250 fine. "Profane swearing" has been illegal in the commonwealth since 1792, when the fine was 83 cents. Just what bleepin' words are banned? Well, the state code doesn't say. But in February 2020, legislators said to hell with the anti-swearing law: The Virginia Senate voted to repeal it, just weeks after the House did the same.

The current law doesn't seem to be stopping many people from doing just that, though. Statewide enforcement numbers are hard to pin down, but according to The Washington Post, Arlington County in Northern Virginia only charged three people with cursing over two years. Other communities have been more proactive. The Oceanfront area of Virginia Beach long had no-cursing signs on its boardwalk – you can even buy replica versions at tchotchke gift shops. The signs were put up by the visitor's bureau to "encourage courteous language" in a family-friendly area, the Virginian-Pilot reported.

The effort to repeal the anti-swearing law appeared to be cursed in previous legislative sessions, failing every year since it was first introduced in 2016. Republican Del. Michael Webert – a cattle farmer from Fauquier County – has sponsored the bill every year. "When you're working with cows and a 1400-pound animal doesn't do what you want it to, or steps on your feet, every once in a while something colorful comes out of your mouth," Webert told The Washington Post in 2017.

So why did the bill finally pass in 2020? Webert tells NPR it's because of the new makeup of the statehouse after Democrats took over both chambers in November. He also cited bipartisanship. "Every time we brought it, it failed," Webert says. "And this year, we put it in and then [Democratic Del. Dawn Adams] put it in as well. ... It was a good match." He says he and his Democratic colleagues agree that the current code violates free speech and is unconstitutional. Opposition to the bill was also bipartisan: Two Democratic and five Republican senators voted against it.

Democratic legislators in Virginia are also working to remove outdated racist and discriminatory laws from the books. State lawmakers also voted to repeal the law against fornication, defined as "voluntary sexual intercourse by an unmarried person." But they voted to keep the ban on spitting, with one lawmaker calling it "yucky."


Meanwhile, in Mississippi, it's still illegal to curse in public, and it could cost you \$100 or 30 days in jail. And according to a Georgia law, using "obscene and vulgar or profane language" is considered disorderly conduct, but only if you're in the presence of someone under age 14.

Florida Man Finds Tongues from the 1960's

(Stonie Williams for Oddee.com) - A contractor was doing some work on a home; minding his own business, when he found dozens of jars containing human tongues inside a crawl space. Police were dispatched after receiving a 911 call saying that human remains, dating back to the 1960s, had been found in the crawl space of a house that once belonged to Dr. Ronald A. Baughman, a world-renowned pathologist and former University of Florida professor.

Baughman said that he had obtained the specimens as a part of his research and brought them home with the intention of using them for additional work, according to the New York Post. He stored them in the crawl space because it was a cool area. Chief Inspector Jorge Campos said there were half a dozen, gallon-sized jars containing human tongues. He said that the tongues were used for research on thyroid and neck conditions, and were meant to be brought back to the University. Baughman's ex-wife now owns the home and forgot the jars were there.

University of Florida Spokesperson said: "I don't know what the policies and laws would have been like 50 years ago or whenever it was, but I can tell you that today that's not something that would be permitted. There are very strict federal and state laws as well as university policies that prohibit that. It would be neither appropriate or legal for a faculty member or researcher to bring something like that home."
