Tiny House Goes for Big Bucks

Newton, MA (AP, 11/4/2021) — A tiny home in a wealthy Boston suburb has sold after about a month on the market, albeit for far less than the original asking price of almost \$450,000. The roughly 250-square-foot (23-square-meter) home in Newton sold on Monday for \$315,000, according to Coldwell Banker Realty's Hans Brings Results agency. The home, on a 0.06-acre lot (0.02 hectares), went on the market in late September.

The house built in 1970 is described as an "adorable tiny studio home ... featuring completely open living space," with a loft and "ready to finish basement," and recent renovations including a new bathroom and electrical upgrades. Several unusual homes in the Boston area's hot real estate market have sold for high prices in the past several months. Boston's famous 10-footwide Skinny House sold in September for \$1.25 million, and a home gutted by fire in Melrose sold for nearly \$400,000.





8-kilogram Mutant Spud "Doug" Could Be World's Heaviest Potato: **DEVO Unavailable for Comment**

(Sky News, 11/4/2021) - A small farm owner weeding his garden got a giant surprise when his hoe struck an object beneath the soil's surface.

At first, Colin Craig-Brown thought it might be some strange fungal growth. But after digging it out, scratching the skin's surface and tasting it, he realized it was... a monster potato. "We couldn't believe it," his wife, Donna, said. "It was just huge."

The couple from Hamilton, New Zealand, believe the potato is selfsown and may have been growing for a couple of years or more. They are waiting to find out if the spud, weighing 7.8kg (17.2lbs), has made it into the Guinness World Records book as the world's heaviest potato.

The current record has been held since 2011 by a potato from Shepton Mallett, Somerset - which weighed a mere 4.98kg (10lb 14oz).

Since deciding to call their mutant-looking vegetable Doug, it's been enjoying a bit of celebrity status. They have built a small cart to tow the ugly potato around town. "We put a hat on him. We put him on Facebook, taking him for a walk, giving him some sunshine," Craig-Brown said. But the monster find is proving difficult to look after, as it begins to dry out and get moldy. Craig-Brown insists the potato has not had its chips yet - he's left it in his fridge and plans to turn it into potato vodka.

536 dancers break Guinness record for longest soul train line Ben Hooper, UPI, 11/23/2021

Cable network BET broke a Guinness World Record in New York by recruiting 536 people to dance in the world's longest soul train line.

BET, which arranged the event in advance of Sunday's Soul Train Awards, said the soul train line that danced through Marcus Garvey Park in Harlem included original dancers from the iconic Soul Train TV shows, the Brooklyn United marching band, the 40+ Double Dutch Club and hundreds of local residents.

A Guinness adjudicator was on hand to ensure participants followed the record-keeping organization's rules. They were required to dance in pairs for at least 40 feet to qualify as a soul train.

Guinness confirmed the soul train line featured 536 dancers, enough to take the record from Goodyear Ballpark in Arizona, which convened a soul train line of 426 dancers in 2014.

In Charleston, South Carolina, Cara Koscinski and her whole family were looking forward to her son Jacob's May 19 graduation party. The Post and Courier reported he had excelled in his Christian-based homeschool program, earning a 4.79 GPA and the summa cum laude distinction, an honor Koscinski included in the wording on the cake she ordered online from her local Publix store. When the software informed her "profane/special characters (are) not allowed," Koscinski made clear that phrase was Latin, meaning "with the highest distinction," and even included a link to a website explaining it. Still, when the cake arrived, it read: "Congratulations Jacob! Summa --- laude Class of 2018." Jacob was embarrassed, and Koscinski had to tell her 70-year-old mother why the store had censored the word. Publix offered to remake the cake, but as Koscinski noted, "You only graduate once."

The System Works Just Fine: 43 Cents' Worth of Mtn Dew = Felony and 7 Years Prison Time


Harrisburg, PA (AP, 10/26/2021) — Pennsylvania prosecutors have dropped a felony theft charge against a man who underpaid for a bottle of Mountain Dew by 43 cents. Prosecutors in Perry County dropped the theft charge against Joseph Sobolewski, 38, and downgraded another charge, the Patriot-News reported.

In August 2021, Sobolewski went into an Exxon in Duncannon and saw a sign advertising two 20-ounce Mountain Dew bottles for \$3, he said. He took one bottle, slapped \$2 on the counter for what he thought was a \$1.50 soda and walked out, not realizing the discount did not apply to a single bottle. The bottle really cost \$2.29, so including tax, he owed the store 43 cents.

State police found Sobolewski and arrested him on a felony charge. A judge ordered him held on \$50,000 cash-only bond. He was in jail for seven days before his public defender successfully argued for his release, the newspaper reported.

Sobolewski had twice in the past 10 years been charged with theft, once for not paying for a tank of gas and another time for stealing a pair of shoes from a store. Under Pennsylvania's three-strikes law, a third theft charge must be a felony, regardless of the amount or value involved. He faced up to seven years in prison.

Warsaw (Reuters, 6/11/2021) - Supermarket chain Carrefour SA notified local police after employees at one of its Warsaw stores found suspicious parcels in a delivery of bananas, which police later confirmed to be cocaine. "They immediately notified the police, who quickly secured the batch of goods and started an investigation that is currently underway," Carrefour said in an email to Reuters, adding that it was cooperating with the investigation.

Warsaw police said the packages contained over 160 kilograms (352.74 lbs) of cocaine worth 30 million zlotys (\$8.14 million). "Drugs were discovered at several branches of one of the chain stores," Warsaw police said on Twitter. State run news agency PAP reported that the first packages with cocaine were found in a Carrefour store in the center of Warsaw and that later the drug was discovered also in other shops in the capital and nearby.

A man who recently moved with his wife from the Washington, D.C., area to Texas brought along something unusual -- his collection of more than 70,000 items related to Star Wars villain Darth Vader. Bill McBride, who recently moved to the Rio Grande Valley with his wife, Rebecca, said he started collecting Darth Vader items when he was young and turned the "Vader Vault" into a serious collection about 30 years ago.

McBride estimated in 2015 that he had spent about \$270,000 on what was then just over 60,000 items, and his collection has since grown to more than 70,000 items, with the total price unknown. "I couldn't afford my own collection today," McBride told KVEO-TV.

McBride said his collection of toys, paintings, unique helmets and other items continues to grow. "It's something that still brings me joy and still truly makes me happy to do it. We all have our hobbies and our interests, and this is something I truly enjoy," he said.

McBride said one item that he takes particular pride in is an original stage performance helmet from George Lucas' Super Live Adventure in Japan.

Election Ends in Tie, Then Gets Twisty

Portland, ME (AP, 11/3/2021) – A ranked choice ballot where numbers were crunched by a computer ended in a tie in a City Council race, so the contest will be decided with a low-tech solution: basically, drawing straws.

The race for an at-large council seat resulted in a numeric tie between Roberto Rodriguez and Brandon Mazer, city officials said. The two candidates both had 8,529 votes after the votes were calculated in a four-way race, officials said. The election will be settled in public, in front of Portland City Hall, when lots — something such as random straws — are drawn on Thursday.

Portland is one of a handful of cities that uses ranked voting for local races, allowing voters to prioritize candidates in races where there are more than two people running. If no one gets more than 50% of the total vote, second-choice votes come into play.

NFATB EDITOR'S NOTE:

This story got even better when I went online to see who won the straw-draw. When the time came for the draw, officials drew Mazer's name from a hat, declaring him the winner. Rodriguez asked for a recount of the original vote, which was granted. On November 10, after a recount of the more than 21,000 votes, Rodriguez was declared the winner, with a margin of about 35 votes.

As reported by Annie Ropeik for Spectrum News Maine: Mazer said he's proud to have been part of a historic moment in Portland politics, regardless of the outcome: "It's been incredible. If you're going to lose, lose with a tie, a draw and then a recount." The whole saga is thought to be the first tie in a ranked choice election anywhere in the country, and the first time Portland has had to invoke its tie-breaker provision.

Underwater Lot for Sale; No Interest from Local Flippers Julie Gordon, Reuters, 7/5/2021

Ottawa, ON – A 19-acre (7.7-hectare) lot for sale in a protected bay on the Canadian side of Lake Erie may look like a steal at C\$99,000 (US\$80,292), especially with the average home in Canada now worth C\$688,000, but there is a catch: it's entirely underwater.

The vacant lot on Brock Street in Shrewsbury, Ontario, has no actual address, though the neighborhood gets high marks for being quiet and car friendly. "This property is presently under water but could have endless possibilities in the future. Be creative," the listing reads. The real estate agent representing the property declined to comment on what those future possibilities might be.

Water lots, or submerged lands, are not very common in Canada. They are typically used for the storage of boats and other water vessels, or even for logs, and in some areas, they are home to fish farms.

A water lot could potentially be used for mooring a houseboat or floating home, but it would need to include some type of land access; the Brock Street property does not have any. There are currently at least three entirely "underwater" properties listed on Canada's multiple listing services.

5-Hour Bus Tour for the Sleep-Deprived

HONG KONG — Travel-starved, sleep-deprived residents might find a new Hong Kong bus tour to be a snooze.

The 76-kilometer (47-mile), five-hour ride on a regular double-decker bus around the territory is meant to appeal to people who are easily lulled asleep by long rides. It was inspired by the tendency of tired commuters to fall asleep on public transit.

"When we were brainstorming new tours, I saw a social media post from my friend saying that he was stressed out by his work, he couldn't sleep at night," said Kenneth Kong, the marketing and business development manager of Ulu travel, the organizer of the bus tours. "But when he was traveling on the bus, he was able to sleep well. His post inspired us to create this tour that lets passengers just sleep on the bus."



Tickets cost between \$13 to \$51 per person, depending on whether they choose seats on the upper or lower deck. A goodie bag for passengers includes an eye-mask and ear plugs for better sleep. The first "Sleeping Bus Tour" in October 2021 sold out entirely. Some passengers came prepared, bringing their own blankets and changing their shoes to slippers, while others brought travel pillows.

The bus stops so passengers can take photos at scenic spots on the city's Lantau Island. One stop is the aircraft maintenance area near Hong Kong's airport, where passengers can snag selfies with aircraft in the background. Passenger Marco Yung said that he joined the tour because he usually falls asleep on long-distance bus journeys, saying it was a "great opportunity" to get some sleep.

The tendency to fall asleep on public transport is a type of conditioning, according to Dr. Shirley Li, the principal investigator of the Sleep Research Clinic and Laboratory at the University of Hong Kong. "People in Hong Kong don't have enough time to sleep," Li said. "That's why we have to kind of use other times to sleep, which is our daily commute, especially when we are travelling on public transport."





Alcohol made from radioactive Chernobyl apples seized by Ukraine government

The makers of 'Atomik' say that Ukrainian Secret Services took 1500 bottles in violation of the law.

In 2019, a group of scientists and distillers decided to create a bold new type of booze: Atomik, an artisanal alcoholic spirit made from ingredients grown in the Chernobyl nuclear power plant's still-radioactive exclusion zone. (The booze itself was not radioactive after the distilling process.)

Now, the first batch of Atomik is finally complete — and all 1500 bottles of it have been seized by Ukrainian Secret Services agents for unknown reasons, according to a statement from Atomik's manufacturer, The Chernobyl Spirit Company.

"It seems that they are accusing us of using forged Ukrainian excise stamps, but this doesn't make sense since the bottles are for the U.K. market and are clearly labelled with valid U.K. excise stamps," Jim Smith, founder of the company and a professor at the University of Portsmouth in the U.K., said in the statement.

Elina Smirnova, a lawyer representing the company, added that the seizure was a "clear violation" of Ukrainian law. If Atomik does make its way onto shelves, it will be the first consumer product from the Chernobyl region since the infamous 1986 meltdown, the company said.


Soon after the nuclear disaster, officials deemed the Chernobyl exclusion zone — the 1,000-square-mile (2,600 square kilometers) area surrounding the damaged power plant — uninhabitable by humans for 24,000 years. However, plants and animals are now thriving in the region — and so is tourism. According to local tourism officials, Chernobyl sees upwards of 60,000 visitors a year, with visits spiking after the May 2019 debut of HBO's "Chernobyl" miniseries.

Atomik is made from apples grown in Ukraine's Narodychi District, which sits on the edge of the exclusion zone and was heavily polluted by fallout from the meltdown. This region still has a population of nearly 10,000 people, according to Ukraine's State Statistics Service, and must abide by stringent agricultural restrictions.

In the meantime, would you care to try a bottle of wine exposed to cosmic radiation aboard a space station for 14 months? Christie's has announced that it is selling a bottle of French wine that spent more than a year in orbit aboard the International Space Station. The auction house thinks a wine connoisseur might pay as much as \$1 million to own it. The Pétrus 2000 is one of 12 bottles sent into space in November 2019 by researchers exploring the potential for extraterrestrial agriculture. It returned 14 months later subtly altered, according to wine experts who sampled it at a tasting in France.

West Peoria, IL — The King of Rock n' Roll is back in the building.

An Elvis Presley bust that was swiped from a central Illinois bar has been returned after the story of its theft attracted international attention.

Somebody who ain't nothin' but a hound dog made off with an Elvis Presley bust from Jimmy's Bar sometime on October 23, 2021. Six days later, employees at Jimmy's Bar found the missing bust sitting on a porch outside the West Peoria saloon, the Peoria Journal Star reported.

"He's back!" pub owner Jimmy Spears said early Friday, attributing the bust's return to the widespread attention its theft had attracted. On Wednesday, the bar's Facebook page had made an appeal for its return: "No questions asked."

Spears said he was considering ways to improve security for the bust, but for now it's back in its familiar position overlooking the saloon and greeting customers from atop the center of its long bar.

Spears, the bar's owner for 39 years, said his niece bought the bust about 15 years ago at a garage sale for \$20, and it soon became the business' bar-top mascot.

Martin K. Tytell, a typewriter expert, was known as Mr. Typewriter. The post office would deliver to him any letter addressed simply to "Mr. Typewriter, New York." When he mistakenly inserted a character upside down on a Burmese typewriter, it became a standard, even in Burma.



Shirley Wright-Johnson had a crappy shopping experience on September 15, 2021 — literally. Wright-Johnson said she was picking up some items a grocery store in Moore, Oklahoma, with her two daughters when she reached for a bag of frozen pizza rolls. Medieval Shrine Gets Modern Carving: Face Wearing COVID-19 Mask

A historic cathedral in the United Kingdom recently renovated a 14th-century shrine with an update that acknowledges the COVID-19 pandemic: a carved mask covering a stone face.

St. Albans Cathedral in Hertfordshire, England, is Britain's oldest site of continuous Christian worship, completed in 1115 at the burial location of the Christian martyr Alban, Britain's first saint. It includes a shrine to St. Alban, who lived during the third century and was executed after helping future saint Amphibalus (then a Christian priest) escape from Roman authorities. The second, newly-renovated shrine, added in 1350, honors Amphibalus.

In addition to repairing and rebuilding the damaged parts of the shrine, stoneworkers added the new carving to commemorate the health crisis that transformed the world in 2020 and 2021, St. Albans representatives said in a statement. "This tiny little figure on the corner of the shrine of St. Amphibalus will be an important reminder for centuries to come of the events of the past year," tweeted Reverend Abi Thompson, sub-dean of St. Albans.

Shrines in medieval cathedrals held relics of martyred saints. They were important destinations for Christian pilgrims, many of whom traveled great distances to pray at the sacred sites for blessings, forgiveness and healing, according to restoration experts at Skillington Workshop in the U.K. who repaired the damaged shrine and carved the new mask-wearing face. However, many such shrines were damaged or destroyed during the English Reformation in the 16th century, and this included the shrines at St. Albans. Broken pieces of these shrines were found during a cathedral restoration in 1872, and they were reconstructed in the early 1900s. St. Amphibalus' shrine "remained looking rather forlorn," according to Skillingtons, and has now been restored as well.

"The masked figure reminds us that the history of St. Albans stretches forwards as well as backwards," Reverend Thompson said in a statement.

Chernobyl's nuclear fuel is 'smoldering' again, could explode Brandon Specktor, livescience.com, 11/14/2021

Tons of nuclear fuel in the wrecked plant's basement has started to react again, and it's showing no signs of stopping. Nuclear reactions are smoldering again in an inaccessible basement of the wrecked Chernobyl nuclear power plant in Ukraine, according to news reports.

Researchers monitoring the plant — which infamously exploded in a deadly 1986 meltdown — have detected a steady spike in the number of neutrons in an underground room called 305/2. The room is full of heavy rubble, concealing a radioactive mush of uranium, zirconium, graphite and sand that oozed into the plant's basement like lava, before hardening into formations called fuelcontaining materials (FCMs).

Rising neutron levels indicate that these FCMs are undergoing new fission reactions, as neutrons strike and split the nuclei of uranium atoms, creating energy.

For now, this radioactive waste is smoldering "like the embers in a barbecue pit," Neil Hyatt, a nuclear materials chemist at the University of Sheffield in the U.K., told Science magazine. However, it's possible that those embers could fully ignite if left undisturbed for too long, resulting in another explosion.

This potential explosion wouldn't be anywhere near as devastating as the one that shattered the plant in 1986, which resulted in thousands of deaths and spewed a radioactive cloud over Europe, says Maxim Saveliev, a senior researcher with the Institute for Safety Problems of Nuclear Power Plants (ISPNPP). If the nuclear material ignites again, the blast will be largely contained within the steel and concrete cage known as the Shelter, which officials built around the plant's ruined Unit Four reactor one year after the accident.

Still, even a contained explosion would make the long-term mission of removing the plant's FCMs much harder, Saveliev said. The Shelter is old and could easily crumble from the force of an explosion, filling the area with heavy debris and radioactive dust. (The Shelter itself is contained in a larger steel structure called the New Safe Confinement, which was completed in 2018.)


Neutron levels have been steadily rising in room 305/2 for four years, Saveliev said, and could continue rising for several more years without incident. It's possible these nuclear nuggets will fizzle out on their own in that time. But if neutron levels keep rising, scientists will have to intervene.

That is more easily said than done, of course; plant managers have yet to figure out how to access the tons of radioactive material buried below the room's thick layers of concrete debris. Radiation levels are too high for humans to endure, but radiation-resistant robots might be able to drill through the rubble and install neutron-absorbing control rods into the room, according to the ISPNPP.

'Super Death' Coaster Shut Down for Breaking Riders' Bones Ed Mazza, huffpost.com, 8/26/2021

A roller coaster in Japan known for its "super death" acceleration to triple-digit speeds was reportedly shut down after riders suffered serious bone fractures.

Multiple news agencies reported four cases of fractures in the back or neck linked to the Do-Dodonpa coaster at Fuji-Q Highland Park. Vice reported at least six cases of fractures in total, including four in the back or neck.

The BBC described the four back and neck cases as "significant injuries," including a "cervical fracture and a thoracic spine fracture." Japan's Mainichi newspaper said the riders needed up to three months to recover from their injuries.

The theme park billed the coaster as having the world's fastest acceleration, hitting $112~\rm mph$ in just $1.56~\rm seconds-or$ what the company called "super death" acceleration.

Although no cause of injury has been identified yet, one woman said in December that she "might have been leaning forward during the ride," Mainichi reported.

The theme park is coming under fire for not reporting the incidents to the government quickly enough.

"We should have reported earlier," Fuji-Q Highland spokesperson Kimie Konishi told The New York Times. "Now, we hope the injured people will recover as soon as possible."



The theme park made global headlines last year when it advised patrons to "please scream inside your heart" instead of out loud to help stop the spread of the coronavirus.

When it comes to spine or neck fractures, however, the screams were likely to be much more audible.

HOA vs. Spirit of Christmas

Tampa, FL (AP, 11/19/2021) - A Florida family is in trouble with their homeowners association for putting up their Christmas lights too early.

The Moffa family hired a company to decorate the yard of their Tampa home on Nov. 6, WFLA reported. Days later, they received a letter notifying them that they now face a fine for violating their HOA agreement. If they don't remove the lights, they could face fines of \$100 a day, up to \$1,000, the letter said.

Moffa said he has no plans to remove the lights. "That was their only availability, and I can't climb up on the roof myself," he told the TV station, adding he didn't know it was against the rules to put up Christmas lights before Thanksgiving.

An attorney for the Westchase Community Association said a neighbor complained about the display. "Which led to community manager to investigate it," Jonathan Ellis told WFLA. "One of the things they're preventing is from the person that has the holiday lights up all year round or things along those lines." Ellis said the rules are in place to be followed, but said the board is open to discussing changes. Moffa said, however, that the association hasn't been receptive even after they offered to keep the lights off until Thanksgiving.

The AP reported in April that Larios was walking from Los Angeles to San Francisco in the costume. "It was an impulsive decision for sure. I didn't plan it out," said the 33-year-old in the 75-pound brown and white suit he designed. But the journey Larios began on April 12 morphed into something bigger and drew fans from all over. Environmental defense fund (around \$15,000)







